The Chair noted the location of the Open Meetings Act and opened the meeting at 8:33 a.m.

AGENDA ITEM

1 APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF THE STAFF MEETING, JANUARY 24, 2013

MOTION: Amundson moved and Schorr seconded approval of the minutes. Raybould, Schorr, Amundson and Smoyer voted aye. Hudkins was absent. Motion carried 4-0.

2 ADDITIONS TO AGENDA

A. Correspondence from NACO inviting Raybould to be on the Health and Human Services Committee

B. Attendance of Brent Meyer, Weed Control Supervisor at the Nebraska Association of County Officials (NACO) Institute of Excellence

MOTION: Schorr moved and Raybould seconded approval of the additions. Amundson, Schorr, Raybould and Smoyer voted aye. Hudkins was absent. Motion carried 4-0.

3 LEGISLATIVE UPDATE - Gordon Kissel and Joe Kohout, Kissel E&S Associates

Joe Kohout reviewed the Lancaster County Priorities (Exhibit A) and distributed the Bills of Interest Report (Exhibit B).

Kohout said there are at least three Election Commissioner related bills to be heard that afternoon in the Government and Military Veterans Affairs Committee that deal with electronic signatures and petitions, County Board appointment of Election Commissioners and legislative approval of gubernatorial appointed Election Commissioners.

Schorr distributed the NACO Legislative List on First Regular Session Positions (Exhibit C). She said one concern is a bill providing a third envelope for mail-in elections. Concern was expressed by some of the NACO Board that ballots would not be private since the return address could be seen on the envelope when ballots are opened. She noted the substantial cost for a third envelope.

Dave Shively, Election Commissioner, said adding a third envelope would cost around 12 cents per envelope. If sending 30,000 ballots, the added cost would be around \$3,000. This would also increase the weight of the mailing, which would result in another 20 cents per ballot, for a potential of an additional 32 cents per ballot. This does not include staff time of opening an extra envelope. A big election could result in an additional \$9,000 to \$10,000.

Schorr discussed other items, including a split vote between Lancaster and Douglas Counties for the indigent defense fund and the change in agricultural land values to move more schools to the school aid formula.

Mike Thurber, Corrections Director, discussed the increased cost that would result from LB318 (requirement of fingerprinting on an increased number of people). He noted possible criminal penalties for not fingerprinting. Kohout said he would express this concern to Senator McGill. Sheli Schindler, Youth Services Center Director, noted the bill does not clarify if it includes juveniles.

Eagan said Sheriff Terry Wagner was supposed to testify at the LB65 hearing (Sheriff's lab fees). Kissel and Kohout agreed to obtain further information on the hearing.

Eagan said the LB88 (requirement of building permits on farmsteads) hearing did not go very well. He noted that a letter of support was sent by the Board.

Eagan said LB363 (disallow charges for making public record copies up to six hours) is being supported by NACO. Kohout said he would investigate why this is being supported.

Raybould asked about LB381 (photo identification for voting). Schorr said fiscal impact to counties was a concern last year. This year the bill is worded so cost would be incurred by the State. Raybould asked Shively to address the costs. Shively did not think there would be a cost except for a little bit of training.

ADDITIONS TO THE AGENDA

B. Attendance of Brent Meyer, Weed Control Supervisor, at the Nebraska Association of County Officials (NACO) Institute of Excellence

Gwen Thorpe submitted a request from Brent Meyer (Exhibit D).

MOTION: Schorr moved and Raybould seconded to allow Brent Meyer to attend the NACO Institute of Excellence. Raybould, Schorr, Amundson and Smoyer voted aye. Hudkins was absent. Motion carried 4-0.

G. 4-H Achievement Day Proclamation

H. Invitation to Present 4-H Achievement Day Proclamation (Tuesday, February 12, 2012, 6:30 p.m.)

Thorpe said Gary Bergman, Extension Director, would like to have someone present the proclamation at a meeting on February 12. Raybould agreed to attend and present the proclamation.

ADDITIONS TO THE AGENDA

A. Correspondence from NACO inviting Raybould to be on the Health and Human Services Committee

Eagan said NACO sent a letter asking Raybould to join the Health and Human Services Committee (Exhibit E), and she agreed to do so.

4 (A) FARM LEASE NEAR WAVERLY; AND (B) STATE HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES AND HISTORICAL SOCIETY OFFICE SPACE NEEDS - Don Killeen, County Property Manager

Don Killeen said last year the property by Waverly was rented for \$186 per acre. This year the high bid is \$287 per acre by Dean Smith.

MOTION: Schorr moved and Raybould seconded approval of the bid by Dean Smith. Amundson, Schorr, Raybould and Smoyer voted aye. Hudkins was absent. Motion carried 4-0.

Killeen said the State is interested in renting 20,000 to 25,000 square feet of the vacated jail space for the State Historical Society. He thought it could be rented for \$8-10 per foot as is.

EMERGENCY ITEMS AND OTHER BUSINESS

Killeen discussed proposals for the Community Mental Health Center (CMHC) facility. He said the best proposals were with two different appraisers: the CMHC facility for \$4,000 and the blood bank building for \$2,500. There was one lower proposal for the CMHC facility, but it could not be done until the end of May. Eagan said action could be taken after Killeen has proposed contracts.

5 ACTION ITEMS

A. 2012 Public Employer Retirement Plan Annual Report for the Lancaster County 401(a) Employees Retirement Plan

MOTION: Raybould moved and Schorr seconded to authorize Smoyer to sign the report. Raybould, Schorr, Amundson and Smoyer voted aye. Hudkins was absent. Motion carried 4-0.

B. Survey for Designation of Sericea Lespedeza as a Noxious Weed

Meyer requested support from the Board to designate Sericea Lespedeza as a noxious weed (Exhibit F). He explained that the plant has scored high on weed risk assessment, meeting six of the nine criteria.

MOTION: Amundson moved and Raybould seconded to support the designation of Sericea Lespedeza as a noxious weed. Amundson, Schorr, Raybould and Smoyer voted aye. Hudkins was absent. Motion carried 4-0.

6 CONSENT ITEMS

There were no consent items.

7 ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER REPORT

A. NACO Southeast District Meeting (March 14, 2013)

Eagan said there would not be a quorum for the staff meeting on March 14 if too many Board members were attending the NACO meeting. The consensus was to cancel the staff meeting.

B. Meeting with Governor Heineman (February 4, 2013)

Schorr and Amundson agreed to attend.

C. Railroad Transportation Safety District (RTSD) Funding

Schorr discussed a letter from Mayor Beutler on future funding for the RTSD. Two proposals had to do with amending State Statutes, which currently have no legislation introduced. Option 3 is to have the RTSD taken over by a Joint Public Agency. Option 4 is to dissolve the RTSD and have the City take over the functions. Schorr said the goal was to have more input on how the RTSD levy rate is set. Currently the levy rate is recommended by the RTSD but the final decision falls to the County.

Smoyer felt the RTSD was functioning properly as is.

Raybould agreed but felt the functionality should be more detailed and the mission better understood.

Amundson felt there should be more time to study the issue.

D. Town Talk Newsletter Subscription Renewal (Denton)

The Board agreed to renewal of the electronic subscription for \$12.

E. County Commissioner Interviews for CARF Survey

Eagan said the intention was to interview Hudkins. Since he may not be available, the consensus was to have Raybould do the interview.

F. Consolidation Committee Applicants

Eagan distributed a list of Consolidation Committee Applicants (Exhibit G). The Board reviewed the list and determined their recommendations.

Minette Genuchi said she was working with B&R Stores on setting up the Mid-Year Budget Retreat. The menu will be a box lunch from Super Saver at a cost of \$5-6 each. She said a letter would be sent out the next week regarding the Retreat.

9 DISCUSSION OF BOARD MEMBER MEETINGS

A. NACO Board Meeting – Schorr

Schorr said most of the meeting was spent discussing the legislative list (Exhibit C). She said the other big item dealt with purchasing a building. Previously space has been rented in three different buildings around the capital. The plan is for expansion, including some covered parking and a conference room. The cost is \$2,200,000 including renovations.

B. Region V Governing Board – Smoyer

Smoyer said there was an election of officers. Most of the discussion revolved around the ITN (Invitation to Negotiate) Committee.

C. Emergency Medical Oversight Governing Board – Schorr

Schorr said discussion would need to be postponed until the next meeting.

D. LIBA - Terrace Grill – Smoyer

Smoyer said there was discussion on the new jail and uses for the old facility.

E. JPA (Corrections) - Smoyer

Smoyer said bills were approved for payment.

Eagan questioned if the staff meeting should be held on Thursday, February 7. He said Amundson and Hudkins would be at the NACO conference that day, and the only agenda items were the legislative update and a claim for review (Exhibit H).

MOTION: Schorr moved and Raybould seconded to forward the claim to the Tuesday Board meeting for approval. Amundson, Schorr, Raybould and Smoyer voted aye. Hudkins was absent. Motion carried 4-0.



RE: Weekly Update on the 2013 Legislature

Please accept this as the third of your weekly reports for the 2013 Legislative Session.

This week saw the beginning of floor debate and continued hearings inside the respective committees. As you are aware, LB405 and LB406 have been scheduled for public hearing next week before the Revenue Committee. As you are aware, these are the Governor's tax cuts.


LANCASTER COUNTY PRIORITIES:

1. **Oppose Elimination of the inheritance tax.** As we reported last week, no bills were introduced to eliminate the inheritance tax. Only one bill, Senator Wightman's LB600 that would lower rates of taxation.
2. **Support Expansion of Medicaid under the Affordable Care Act.** LB577 was introduced by Senator Kathy Campbell and has been slated for public hearing on February 28, 2013 before the Health and Human Services Committee.
3. **Eliminate Responsibility of Counties to Pay HHS Rent.** Senator Kate Bolz introduced LB632 and it has been referred to the Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee. No hearing date has been scheduled yet.
4. **Modify Right to Court Appointed Attorney in Juvenile Court.** Senator Colby Coash introduced LB342 and it has been referred to the Judiciary Committee. No hearing date has been scheduled yet.
5. **Definition and Oversight for Staff Secure Juvenile Detention Facilities.** Senator Amanda McGill introduced LB86 and it has been referred to the Judiciary Committee. No hearing date has been scheduled yet.

OTHER LEGISLATION:

1. **LB284 (Conrad) Change provisions of the Political Subdivisions Tort Claims Act relating to actions and amounts recoverable.** *OPPOSE.* Referred to the Judiciary Committee, the hearing on this bill has not yet been scheduled.
2. **LB215 (Schilz) Change provisions relating to use of the County Visitors Promotion Fund.** *NO POSITION.* We have visited with Senator Schilz's office about our concerns. We are to follow up with him.
3. **LB241 (Sullivan) Authorize voters to change election of county offices from partisan to nonpartisan.** *NO POSITION.* This bill has been slated for public hearing on February 7, 2013 before the Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee.







FACT SHEET: Sericea Lespedeza (*Lespedeza cuneata*)


Sericea Lespedeza (*Lespedeza cuneata*) is being considered to become a noxious weed in Nebraska. The Nebraska Weed Control Association (NWCA) supports this effort and recently the Nebraska Noxious Weed Advisory Committee (NNWAC) voted to recommend to the Director of Agriculture to add sericea lespedeza to the Nebraska Noxious Weed List.

Currently sericea lespedeza exists mainly in southeastern Nebraska in several counties. The majority of those counties have already added sericea lespedeza to their noxious weed list in an effort to prevent its spread.

The Nebraska Invasive Species Council (NISC) recently completed a Weed Risk Assessment (WRA) of sericea lespedeza. The WRA is a scientific study used to identify the potential risk of spread in Nebraska. The results showed sericea lespedeza had a **very high risk** to invade almost **98% of land in Nebraska**.

Spread Potential

Sericea lespedeza is present and considered invasive or weedy in 31 states, it is already a noxious weed in Kansas and Colorado. It was first introduced into the United States in 1896, and the oldest Nebraska record is 1974 in Richardson County. *Sericea lespedeza* has already spread to at least 8 counties in the southeast part of the state. Initial use as hay crop facilitated its spread throughout the eastern United States. It is also readily spread by wildlife and livestock.




Predicted distribution of sericea lespedeza in the United States

Impact Potential

Sericea lespedeza (*Lespedeza cuneata*) is a long-lived perennial forb that grows well in grasslands, pastures, along roadsides, drainage areas, fencerows and other disturbed areas. *Sericea lespedeza* is an extremely aggressive invader of open areas. Dense monocultures or thickets are formed due to its ability to sprout from root crowns.

Established *sericea lespedeza* plants will reduce or eliminate competing vegetation and restrict the amount of light reaching other plants. Its tall, upright growth with multiple branches and dense foliage produces heavy shading.

Although originally introduced as a forage plant, it has stems that become tough and unpalatable unless kept continually mowed or grazed. In a mixture with grass it usually becomes the dominant species after 3 to 4 years. In natural areas, these stands can become so dense that native plants are reduced. It also produces chemicals, such as tannins, that can inhibit the growth of other plants and promote the formation of pure stands of *Lespedeza cuneata*. Seed production rates of 150 million to 300 million seeds per acre were reported for cultivated stands and there are reports that 1,500 seeds can be produced on a single *sericea lespedeza* stem. It readily escapes from cultivation into native grasslands and agricultural areas, and can seriously impact pastures and natural areas. Initial use as hay facilitated its spread throughout the eastern United States and it is readily spread



by several species of wildlife and by livestock. When compared with 200+ other assessments, ***Lespedeza cuneata* ranked among top high risk plants based upon its reported impact and ability to establish and spread.** Further monitoring for and investigation of this species will aid in predicting its invasive potential and will help assess its ability to spread beyond southeastern Nebraska.

We need everyone's cooperation

Everyone's cooperation is needed in preventing & spotting new infestations as well as taking actions needed to assure eradication with follow-up to prevent re-establishment. This early vigilance and action will prevent the potential harm and huge cost of controlling large established stands of sericea lespedeza.

Making *sericea lespedeza* a noxious weed statewide will allow County Weed Authorities to learn how to identify *sericea lespedeza*, make them better prepared to spot new infestations and eliminate small infestations before they become widespread. ***If your County does NOT have sericea lespedeza, you don't want it and are encouraged to support it becoming a noxious weed. If your County already has sericea lespedeza, you wouldn't want it to spread to neighboring counties and should support adding it to the noxious weed list.***

Why are Invasives a Concern to me?


The State of Nebraska has had a noxious weed law in place for many years, however until recently, we did not have a plan of action for other invasive weeds coking into our State. Within the last few years, weed control authorities have begun to monitor other weeds known as the "Watch List". These species have met criteria of concern and may be noxious in other surrounding states.

We will always deal with noxious weeds in our state; however, we want an early warning system to help landowners fight new invaders for years to come. This early detection and rapid response program has helped landowners control hundred of acres and at less of an economic loss. Controlling these weeds at an early stage of invasion has saved money.



SERICEA LESPEDEZA – Grassland Invader

Common Name: Sericea Lespedeza or Chinese Bush clover

Growth Form: Forb

Life Span: Perennial

Origin: East Asia

Flowering Dates: July–October

Inflorescence: Clusters of 2-4 (usually 2) flowers, sometimes solitary, auxiliary

Flower: White or cream to yellow-ish corolla, marked with purple or pink along the veins of the banner petal (6-9 mm long); wings and keel equal, shorter than the banner; typical 5-petaled legume flower; calyx tube silky (0.5-1 mm long), teeth 5; teeth lance-subulate (3-5 mm long)

Fruit: Pod (legume), oval (2.5-3.5 mm long), glabrate or with appressed pubescence; seeds 1

Seed: 1/16 to 1/8 inch long and tan or greenish in color

Leaves: Alternate; blades pinnately 3-foliolate; leaflets cuneate (1-2.5 cm long), erect or ascending, tips round to flat with a mucro, upper surface without hart to pubescent, lower surfaces pubescent; stipules setaceous (3-12 mm long); petioles reduced upward (1-5 mm long)

Stems: Erect; branches numerous, straight, slender, grooved, pubescent; mature stems somewhat woody with small bristles or spines

Underground: Taproot

Where Found: Southeastern Great Plains in grasslands, abandoned fields, roadsides, stream valleys, open woods, thickets, and waste places. (NE, KS, OK, TX, IA, & MO)

Uses and Values: Forage quality is low. Foliage eaten by deer, rabbits, and wild turkeys. Seeds are eaten by quail and other birds

Poisoning: It contains relatively high levels of tannins which do not poison, but they reduce forage digestibility.

Other: Sericea is spreading rapidly as contaminate in grass seed. Seeds remain viable for more than 20 years.

HISTORY OF LESPEDEZA

The North Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station first planted Sericea lespedeza in the United States in 1896. Little study or use of Sericea Lespedeza was done until 1924 when the USDA secured seed from Japan and planted it at the Arlington Experiment Farm in Virginia. Its perceived value at the time for erosion control, hay, wildlife cover and food, and seed production was generally accepted. Sericea was first used as a protective cover for sites with poor soils. It was not widely used for pasture until the late 1940s. Sericea lespedeza is adapted to climatic conditions extending from Florida to Texas, north to Nebraska, and east to the Atlantic Coast, through the states of Michigan and New York. It grows best where annual precipitation is 30 inches or more and has survived winter temperatures of -17 degrees Fahrenheit. Planting continued until the 1970's

IMPACT

Kansas & Missouri

A BATTLE LOST

Both Kansas and Missouri have battled this invader for many years and now in Kansas alone has over 650,000 acres while Missouri has estimated its spread in each county. Missouri is just now starting an awareness campaign. In Oklahoma, Sericea is growing in all parts, except the Panhandle.

NEBRASKA'S IMPACT

Many Kansas representatives have stated they wish they were Nebraska and have a chance to stop this invader in its tracks. Currently, Nebraska has reported 1,500+ acres in 9 counties in the southeast.

CONTROLLING SERICEA LESPEDEZA

Nebraska is only beginning to seek out Sericea monitoring on a higher level.

MECHANICAL CONTROL CULTURAL CONTROL

Haying a field and allowed to cure thoroughly has a benefit and takes advantage of its high protein content. After the hay has cured, this can then be fed to cattle. Cattle or goats may graze on Sericea until the tannin levels are high. Grazing early can influence its growth however; Sericea like all clovers grows back quickly.

BIOLOGICAL CONTROL

At present, there are no viable biological control methods available to control Sericea.

CHEMICAL CONTROL

Using chemicals to control Sericea is on going. Like Leafy Spurge, the key to Sericea control is timing and follow through. Large infestations typically take five to ten years to establish. Using the right herbicide at the right time will help.

INTEGRATED APPROACH

Correct timing of various control methods, mechanical, cultural, and chemical, may be the best approach and may be cost effective. Grazing and mowing with chemical control can improve a field and lessen the impact of Sericea on the pasture. CRP poses even a bigger problem with control methods. Using a variety of tools in one year will help in the end.

Counties in Kansas have had good success with using goats as a means to control the spread of Sericea by reducing the foliage

growth and reducing the seed stock. Cattle producers have also noted good grazing until the mid summer where tannin levels have increased.

WHAT CAN YOU DO



Scott believes he can be an objective and unbiased asset to a task force created to study the possible consolidation of City & County agencies.

R. Scott Sandquist's extensive career has evolved almost entirely in the design and construction industry. Scott initially learned the carpentry trade working on the job for his father as early as seventh grade and continuing all through high school. It was during these early years that Scott first developed a love of building and construction. After high school, Scott moved to Lincoln and worked largely as a heavy equipment operator on highway construction projects for two years before returning to his carpentry roots as a framer and finish carpenter for several commercial contractors in Lincoln.

In the mid and late seventies, Scott purchased several residential real estate properties, all requiring various repairs and upgrading. Scott directly performed this weekend and after-hours work which helped him develop a wider perspective of real estate, landlord tenant relationships, owner's roles and needs, and a broader perspective of residential construction from an owner's viewpoint.

In the late seventies while still working fulltime construction and part-time upgrading his real estate properties, Scott also took classes and became a licensed Realtor. Scott suggests that both formal and informal education in real estate - real estate law, sales, lending and fiduciary requirements, contracting, and other related areas required as a licensed Realtor continually overlap into the design and construction industry, and have always provided him with extremely applicable and broad

based knowledge. Scott's concrete and masonry skills also expanded as a during this time, until he eventually returned to school in 1980 at the University of Nebraska – Lincoln, very determined to become an Architect.

As University students, Scott soon met his wife-to-be, Amy Thomas who was about to graduate from UNL and begin her first career in sales at A.T. Thomas Jewelers, the 'family business'. With Amy's help, Scott worked part-time as a finish carpenter to put himself through school without taking out school loans. In 1985 Scott and Amy were married, solidifying their becoming teammates for life. Incidentally, Scott also received his Bachelor of Architecture degree later that same year.

In 1986, Scott and Amy spent six months in Europe where Scott continued his formal architectural education in London. They fondly view their travels as a great time that was also quite educational in various regards. Upon their return back to Lincoln, Scott began his internship with a small architectural firm while continuing graduate school. He continued working there for another year after receiving his Master of Architecture degree from UNL in 1987. Scott still considers those years of on-the-job architectural training, playing the various roles required at an architectural design firm to have been an extremely valuable and diverse learning experience.

Scott and Amy decided the time was appropriate for starting a family, and their first son, Max was born in 1988. Son Rex was born two years later, and daughter Sammy was born in 1993. Scott and Amy are extremely proud of their children, and have those rather natural mixed feelings about recently becoming "empty nesters".

Nearly all construction projects seem to have the triangular relationship of 1) Owner, 2) Architect or designer, and 3) Contractor. Scott's next role continuing in the design and construction industry was as a representative for the Owner – in this case, in the 'public sector' for the Nebraska Air National Guard (NEANG) at the Lincoln Municipal Airport. 


